

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

The hammam at Çırağan was one of the jewels of the entire palace. Smoky grey veining of different shades ran through the glistening white marble that covered the floors, walls and ceilings. The rooms were flooded with natural light that streamed in through the large windows overlooking the Bosphorus and the lower terraces of the gardens of Yıldız, as well as from roof lanterns cut into the domes above each chamber. Yet more light filtered in through windows in the ceilings, each one shaped like an eight-pointed star. Set into the thick marble walls were ornate arched alcoves and recesses holding oil lamps and candles which flickered as they burned, creating dancing shadows behind them. Elaborate friezes with interlaced geometric patterns were carved into the architraves around each door and window, and every marble panel and niche was decorated with intricate floral motifs and symmetrical latticework. Tiered marble mugarnas projected out from beneath the ceilings, giving the impression that honeycomb was dripping down onto those below. The constant sound of water flowing from the bronze taps into the marble basins soothed the ear, ensuring a harmonious and relaxing atmosphere.





Interview Questions

Where does the inspiration for your books come from?

The inspiration for my books originates from the many fascinating stories and precious recollections my grandparents shared with me. They were both born in Istanbul during the twilight years of the Ottoman Empire and lived through immense change and upheaval. As a child, I was captivated by all that they had witnessed and experienced, and this ignited my passion for preserving their forgotten world and honouring their memory through storytelling. Also, I feel that my books offer my children and future grandchildren a way to understand and appreciate their heritage.

Which of the locations mentioned in your book is your favourite place in Istanbul?

Istanbul has so many beautiful places that I do not think that I can pick just one, so I have chosen three. The Hagia Sophia Grand Mosque: because I always feel a sense of calm and serenity sweep over me when I visit, as it is such a spiritual and uniquely beautiful place. Topkapi Palace: because I love the classical style of Ottoman architecture and because this Palace is steeped in so much history – every piece of stone, every marble pillar and every hand painted tile has a story to tell and a secret to share. The Bosphorus: because the views from anywhere along its shores makes me feel like I am 'home'.

Tell us about Sultan Murad V, one of the main protagonists of the book.

He was intelligent, well-educated and extremely charismatic. He was an enlightened liberal prince, a modern reformist, a talented composer, and a kind, gentle, sensitive man. He would have made an excellent constitutional ruler, and if he had remained on the throne I believe history could have been very different.

How do you feel when you visit the Çırağan Palace - the 'Gilded Cage on the Bosphorus'?

I always feel very emotional. I think this is because it was the home of my branch of the family for so long and is where my grandfather and great-grandfather were born, so it is the place where I feel most connected to my roots.

If readers could take away one message or feeling after finishing your book, what would you want it to be?

I would love my readers to feel a deep sense of empathy with the characters and a connection with the human side of history that I have tried to portray in my book. I also hope to spark a curiosity and encourage my readers to delve deeper into Ottoman history, and perhaps inspire them to embark on their own journey to discover the beauty of Istanbul and to explore its rich history and culture for themselves.
